- **Rehabilitation:** Provide specialized services—including physiotherapy, occupational therapy, speech therapy, doctor consultations, nursing, psychological care, special education, and ortho technician support—to improve physical, cognitive, and communicative abilities.
- **Community Outreach Programs:** Extending support and resources to marginalized communities, fostering awareness and inclusion.
- **Orthotics and Prosthetics:** Offering access to essential orthotic and prosthetic devices and related services to improve mobility and independence.
- **Vocational Skill Training:** Equipping individuals with marketable skills for sustainable livelihoods.
- **Farming and Eco-friendly Agriculture:** Promoting environmentally conscious agricultural practices and providing opportunities in this vital sector.

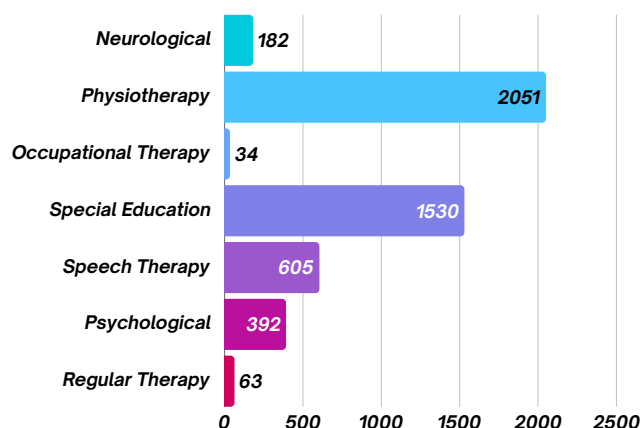

“Therapeutic support enabling self-reliance for disabled children and their families.”

KIRAN's school's Physio and Occupational unit has long supported disabled children with well-trained therapists. Therapists help children to walk (with or without aids) and train wheelchair users and disabled children in daily living activities, fostering independence in school and at home. The unit also trains parents and do home visits when required, to suggest environmental modifications for better community participation.

Community-Based Rehabilitation

The Community-Based Rehabilitation (CBR) Unit of KIRAN Society is committed to empowering children and youth with disabilities, as well as their families, by delivering essential services directly within their communities. Our work is grounded in a holistic, rights-based approach that focuses on early identification, intervention, rehabilitation, and community awareness.



“During this period, the CBR Unit implemented two major projects”

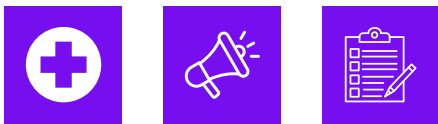


Project 1. GANESH

The GANESH (General movement assessment in neonates for Early Identification and Intervention, social support and health awareness) Project aims to detect and help infants at high risk of developmental disabilities in Mirzapur and Varanasi districts. AAAs (ASHA, Anganwadi and Auxiliary Nurse Midwife) collect newborn data, and at-risk infants are evaluated via video using General Movement Assessment by experts. The KIRAN team then provides interventions based on this assessment. The project also trains AAAs and educates adolescent girls and pregnant women on health, while providing nutritional aid to underweight children.

Key Achievements April 2024 – March 2025

- Successfully identified **1914** newborns.
- Completed **256** video recordings.
- Delivered monthly nutritional support to underweight children.
- Reached **83** children through **5** organized medical camps.
- Offered therapeutic and educational support to 83 families.
- Facilitated **15** AAA meetings and a Parents Training Program.
- Nutrition counselling provided to **126 families.**

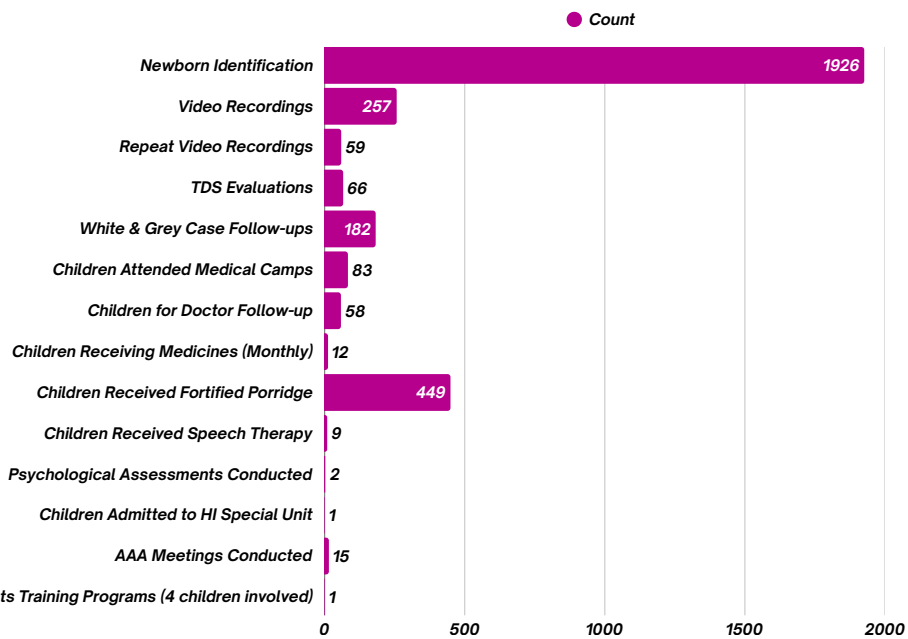

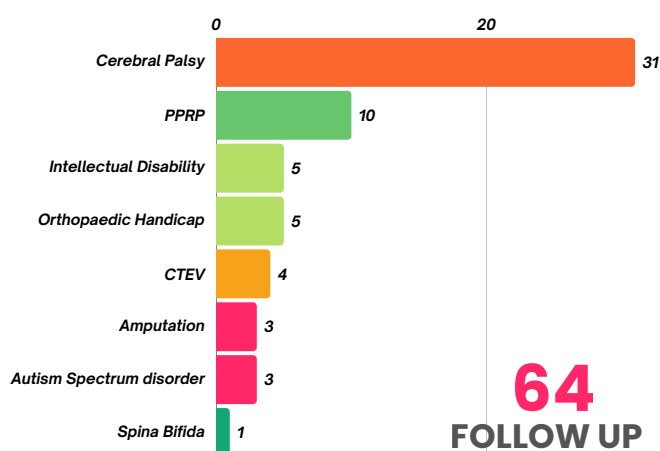
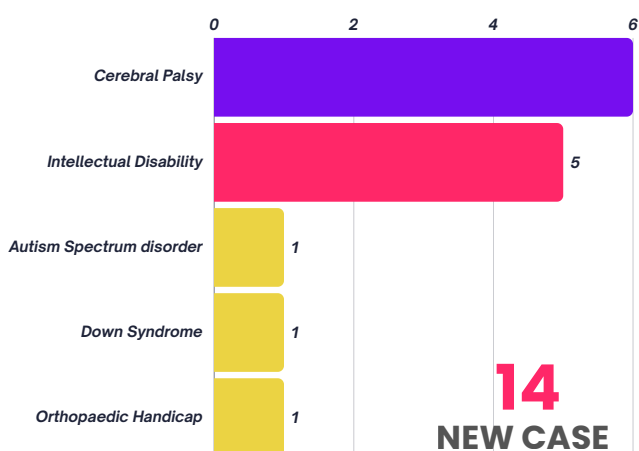

Project 2. Neuro-Disability

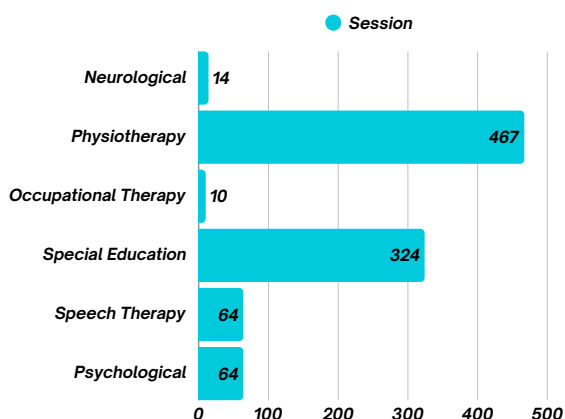
“Empowering Futures, One Home Visit at a Time”

For those needing more intensive support, we arrange transportation to KIRAN Society, offering a comprehensive suite of centre-based therapies.

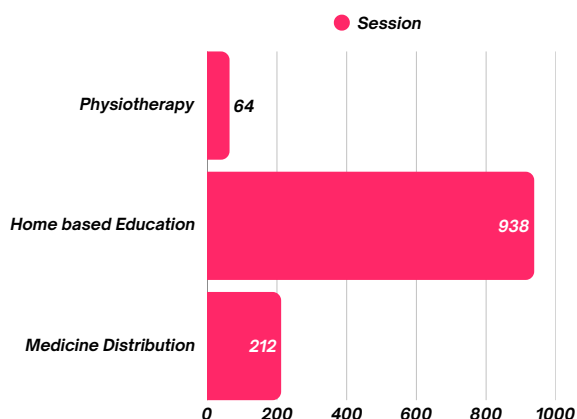

OUTREACH UNIT

“Bringing healing hands to remote communities”

The Outreach Unit, part of KIRAN’s Health Department, brings rehabilitation to underserved rural communities in four Uttar Pradesh districts: Varanasi, Chandauli, Mau, and Mirzapur. Partnering with local organizations, the unit conducts scheduled rehabilitation camps in each district, ensuring timely support for children and youth with disabilities in marginalized communities.

Future Directions:

Building on our current success, the Outreach Unit will continue to prioritize expanding our reach and enhancing the depth of our services. Our commitment remains steadfast in fostering inclusive development and empowering families within the community.



KEY HIGHLIGHTS AND ACHIEVEMENTS

- **Expanded Service Delivery:** Our dedicated professionals addressed **520** cases, including **87** new enrollments identified by the Outreach Unit and **695** crucial follow-up sessions.
- **Successful Outreach Initiatives:** Through **26** outreach rehabilitation camps, we reached **467** individuals, comprising **243** new cases and **224** follow-up visits, demonstrating the continued reliance on our community-based support.
- **Empowered Caregivers:** We equipped **245** parents with essential child-handling skills through structured training in both day-care and residential settings, strengthening their capacity to provide quality care at home.

Promoting Inclusion and Skill Development:

- **13** children with disabilities gained access to inclusive education at the KIRAN Inclusive School.
- **3** young individuals were enrolled in pre-vocational skill training programs, laying the foundation for future independence.

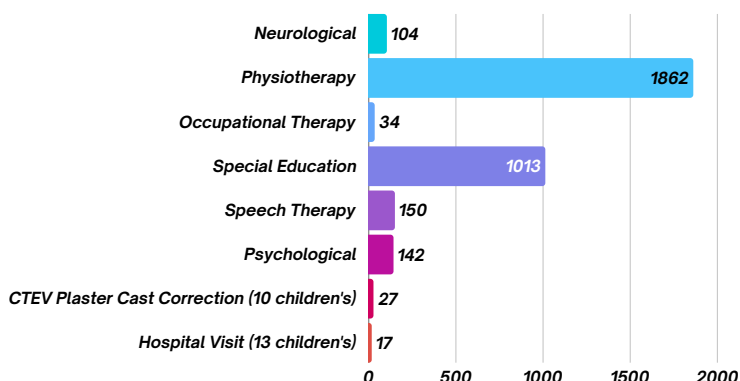

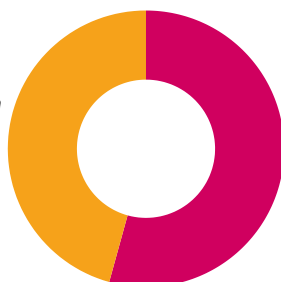

Success Story

“Ishika’s Journey Toward Healing”

*Ishika, a little girl from Naipura village, was diagnosed early under the **G.A.N.E.S.H. (General movement assessment in neonates for Early Identification and Intervention, social support and health awareness) program**. She was found to have a **cleft lip and palate, congenital heart disease, and speech delay**.*

The dedicated staff of the G.A.N.E.S.H. project regularly guided and supported her parents, especially in managing her feeding and overall care. Due to their timely intervention and continuous follow-up, Ishika gained enough weight to undergo the required surgery.

*With the team’s facilitation, **her cleft palate surgery was successfully done free of cost at a private hospital**. Today, Ishika is on the path to better health and development, thanks to the compassionate efforts of the G.A.N.E.S.H. project under **KIRAN Society**.*



Success Story

“**Rudra’s** Journey from Sitting to Walking”

Rudra, a 4-year-old boy from Vishunpura, Sakaldihan (Chandauli), was diagnosed with **cerebral palsy**. His father, Anand Rai, works in a private job, and the family’s financial condition is modest.

At age 3, Rudra attended a **rehabilitation camp at Amar Jyoti Sewa Kendra, where the KIRAN Society team** identified that he could only sit and was unable to walk or perform daily tasks. He was referred to KIRAN Society for further care.

A personalized rehabilitation plan was created, and since then, Rudra and his parents have been regularly attending **1-Month to 3-month intensive therapy stays** at KIRAN’s hostel. During these stays, he receives physiotherapy, special education, and medical support.

Thanks to this consistent care, Rudra has made outstanding progress—from sitting, to walking with support, to now walking independently.

We are sharing photos that capture this remarkable transformation.

His parents are proud and deeply thankful to the **KIRAN Society team at Amar Jyoti Sewa Kendra** for their ongoing support and guidance.





EDUCATION

Introducing

The Education Department includes the Inclusive School, **Kiran Viklang Vidyalaya**. This English medium co-educational school provides inclusive education from Preparatory to Secondary levels (via NIOS). It fosters a supportive environment promoting peer support and holistic development through academics and diverse co-curricular activities, utilizing well-equipped labs. The Secondary stage follows the NIOS curriculum for students aged 15-18 with disabilities or from poor economic backgrounds, leading to 10th and 12th standard board examinations.

SPECIAL UNIT

The Special Education Unit provides need-based, short-term education for children with moderate to severe disabilities (ages 5-12+). Utilizing one-to-one and group teaching, the program emphasizes holistic development with intensive parental involvement. Five groups cater to specific needs:

- **Academic Group (7-10 years):** Prepares children (primarily with cerebral palsy or intellectual disabilities) for potential integration into regular schools.
- **Functional Junior Group (10-12 years):** Focuses on functional literacy and numeracy based on individual abilities.
- **Functional Senior Group (12+ years):** Develops social skills, practical money knowledge, and functional literacy/numeracy.
- **Self Care Group (10+ years):** Uses one-to-one teaching to build daily living and self-care skills.

Section for Hearing Impairment:

- **Basic I (ages 5-7):** Emphasizes language development through lip-reading and gestures, introducing basic literacy, numeracy, and environmental awareness.
- **Basic II (ages 8-12):** Builds language skills through communication, auditory training, lip-reading, and gestures, while introducing sentence reading/writing and subjects like science and social studies.

- **Teaching:** *Providing instruction to students.*
- **Co-curricular Activities:** *Offering crafts, sports, painting, music, and dance.*
- **Special Days:** *Actively participating in and preparing for celebrations at KIRAN.*
- **Teacher Training (Internal):** *Enhancing the skills of Kiran teachers.*
- **Teacher Training (External):** *Training teachers from nearby private schools on inclusive education and classroom management for children with disabilities.*
- **Student Awareness:** *Conducting awareness programs for students in local Varanasi schools.*
- **College Awareness:** *Running awareness and sensitization programs for college students at Kiran.*
- **Parent Workshops:** *Organizing awareness workshops for parents of children with disabilities (current and past students).*
- **Exposure Visits:** *Arranging educational visits for students and staff.*

Success Story

“Nancy's Beyond Barriers:
The Inspiring Journey of
Nancy's Growth.”

Nancy, a young girl with an **intellectual disability** from a family with limited resources, faced significant learning challenges upon joining the Special Education Unit. Initially, basic literacy and numeracy skills were beyond her reach, and she struggled with focus and following instructions. At home, contributing to household tasks also proved difficult for her.

Her educational journey began with tailored functional academic training, utilizing flashcards to introduce numbers and the alphabet. Gradually, she progressed to copying letters and words, laying the foundation for literacy. Recognizing the importance of independence, her education then focused on essential life skills, starting with identifying and handling Indian currency through practical experience at a local shop.

Today, Nancy's progress is truly remarkable. She now communicates effectively, interacts confidently, and demonstrates a caring nature towards her peers. Her key achievements include mastering basic arithmetic, writing skills, managing a small shop, and actively participating in household chores. Nancy's success story underscores the transformative power of individualized support, dedicated teaching, and her own resilience in enabling children with intellectual disabilities to achieve meaningful milestones and lead more independent lives.





HUMAN RESOURCE TRAINING CENTRE

Introducing

HRTC continues its dedicated efforts to tackle the pressing need for qualified special educators and foster inclusive growth for individuals with disabilities. With an eye toward the future, we anticipate enhancing our initiatives and broadening our positive influence in the year ahead.

SPECIAL EDUCATION PROGRAMS

RCI Accreditation Ensures Quality Teacher Training

The Human Resource Training Department successfully completed the **Rehabilitation Council of India (RCI)** inspection in April 2024 for the Diploma in Education – **Special Education (Multiple Disability) [D. Ed.SE (MD)]** course. This critical review of infrastructure, faculty, academics, and outcomes has resulted in a positive outcome: a 3-year extension of the course recognition, reaffirming our commitment to **high-quality special education training**.

ACADEMIC ACTIVITIES

D.ED.SE (MD) PRACTICAL EXAMS COMPLETED

D.Ed.SE (MD) first and second-year internal practical exams assessing hands-on skills for teaching children with multiple disabilities were successfully held on May 28, 2024. Coordinated by faculty and monitored per RCI guidelines, the exams evaluated lesson planning, IEPs, group teaching, and classroom management for special needs.

FACULTY DEVELOPMENT

HRTC core faculty enhanced their expertise in special education through an RCI-led online CRE webinar focused on inclusive practices and skill development for persons with disabilities. This engagement will enrich classroom instruction and curriculum planning for the D.Ed.SE (MD) program.

FAREWELL FELICITATION

Honoring Growth, Celebrating Futures.

A heartfelt farewell program celebrated the achievements of the D.Ed.SE (MD) Batch of 2022-2024 on July 2nd, 2024, marking their successful academic journey with speeches, performances, and well wishes for their careers as special educators.

LEADERSHIP ENGAGEMENT

Welcoming New Special Education Students

The Founder and Executive Director oriented new D.Ed.SE (MD) Batch 2024-2026 students at HRTC. The session highlighted organizational values, goals, the importance of special educators, inclusive education, and the organization's history, encouraging academic excellence and compassionate service. This meeting provided a motivating start to their training.



BRIDGING WORLDS: INCLUSIVE EDUCATION TAKES CENTER STAGE

Fostering inclusive learning through school partnerships and collaborative strategies.

Ms. Neeta (Director, South Point School) and Ms. Jayanti Mishra (Principal) visited to discuss strengthening collaboration, particularly regarding the role of **special educators and inclusive strategies for students with special needs** in regular schools. HEALTH MATTERS AT HRTC

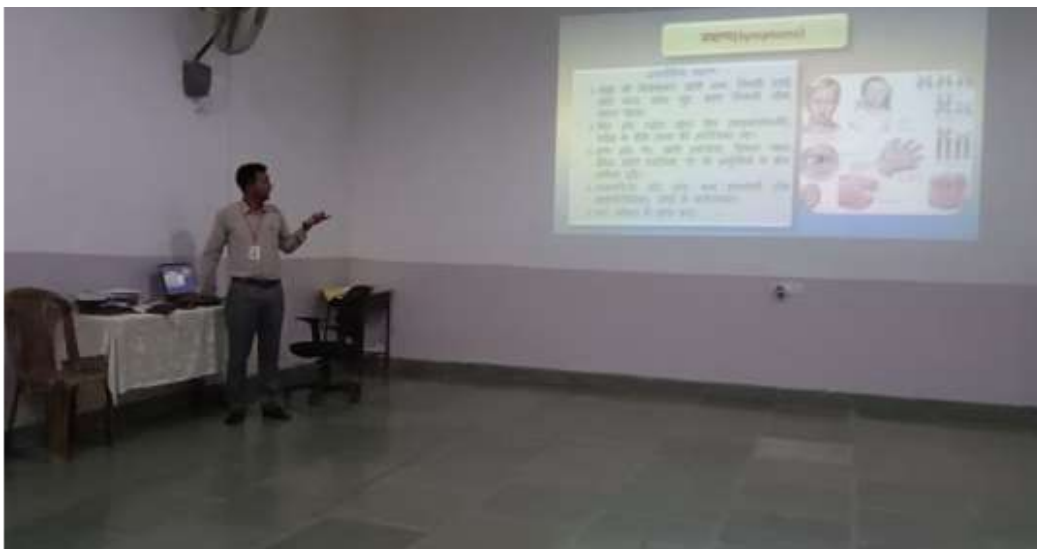
Empowering Health Through Awareness

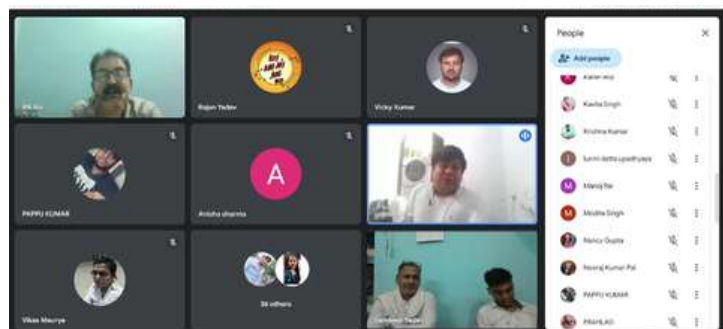


Youth Meeting on Contribution & Development

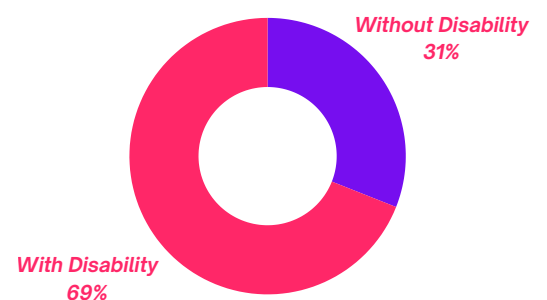
